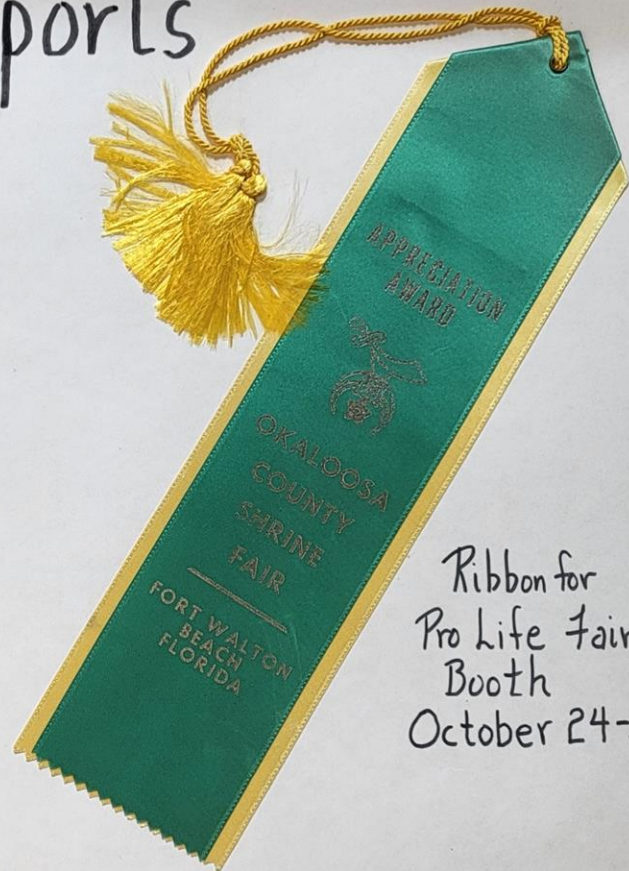

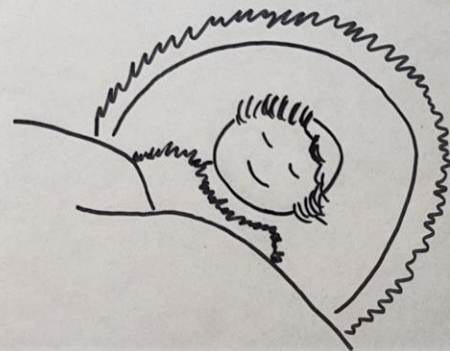

From Prevention . . . Employment . . .

50% OF MENTAL RETARDATION CAN BE PREVENTED.

The ARC of Okaloosa County took on the challenge of prevention. The Developmental Awareness Program (DAP) was initiated in 1979 to provide early identification, comprehensive evaluation and intervention strategies to newborn infants and toddlers who may be at risk of developing handicapping conditions. By providing these services and parent instruction the probability and/or severity of problems later in life can be reduced.



DAP seeks to provide parents with information concerning child development. The Program teaches parents the skills necessary to promote the continued development of language, motor, socialization and self care skills in their children. The task is accomplished through evaluations which are shared with parents, through monthly clinic reviews, weekly home instruction and parent discussion groups. The aid to parents is in addition to clinical services provided for each child, such as appropriate therapies. Evaluation, consultation and information is provided by a registered occupational therapist, a psychological, certified teacher, social worker and speech therapist.



Pediatricians, family physicians and other child care agencies are encouraged to refer parents and their infants to DAP with the intention of preventing serious disabilities during this vital growth and development period. For more information call 244-8644.

The ARC gives clients the priceless opportunity to enter the local market for a community support and encouragement from earning wages funded by the Department of Vocational Rehabilitation. Employers are given tax incentives to train and eventually hire the workers if they meet standards of performance.

After a potential job site is selected, workshop staff meet with employers to discuss requirements of the job and specific training. This process can insure understandings between the employer and the new setting is

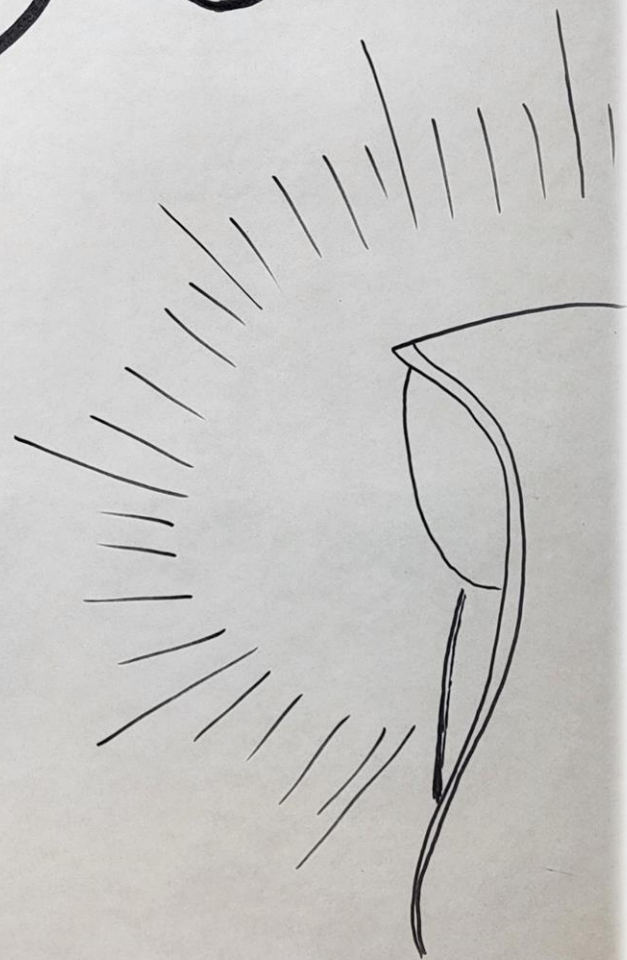

Local Knights attend state convention

Local delegates attended the recent 78th annual Knights of Columbus State Convention, celebrating the 100th anniversary of the Order, in Orlando.

Local Council #4444 delegates and representatives joined their Brother Knights from throughout the state in rededicating themselves to the goals of the Order and paying tribute to their founder, Father Michael J. McGivney.

Throughout the convention, special emphasis was placed on the purpose and dream on which Father McGivney founded the Order a century ago. He saw the need for an organization of Catholic men who would help and financially aid the widows and children of their deceased members. Knights of Columbus has grown to more than 1.4 million members and provides insurance benefits for members and families. Knights play major roles in the areas of youth, pro-life, retarded citizens, church, and community.

Attending from Fort Walton Beach were Frank X. Scandone, re-elected during the convention to serve as State Advocate for the coming year, and Mrs. Scandone; Grand Knight and Mrs. William Nadicksbernd; Grand Knight elect and Mrs. Ray Schilit; State Pro-Life committeeman and Mrs. Carlton Sorenson; State Squires committeeman and Mrs. Frank DePrisco; Faithful Navigator and Mrs. Joseph Franzalla and Mr. and Mrs. William Doherty.

Council #4444 "Pride of the Panhandle" came back with

the Youth Event Award, given for their "Youth Mass." This entry now goes to the Supreme Council and has a chance to win on a nationwide basis. The council also won four trophies for their scrapbook entry, one each for format, for pictures and events, for artwork and forms, and, most importantly, for best overall scrapbook submitted to the Convention.

This is the first time the local council has won any of these awards.

The Convention closing was especially notable. Following the Concelebrated Mass, a Gov. Bob Graham was the breakfast guest speaker. He congratulated the group on their 100th anniversary and centered most of his talk on the family unit. He encouraged the Knights and their families to continue their involvement in church and community. He also spelled out the many needs throughout Florida in the area of law enforcement and criminal institutions and said the increased sales tax is designed to improve these conditions. He talked of his own family and gave some personal insight into the different tasks he has performed as governor.

This year the Knights also celebrate the 25th anniversary of the St. Mary's Council #4444 here in Fort Walton Beach. A dinner was held recently in the council hall honoring the charter members and past grand knights for their efforts and foresight which has enabled the council to grow and carry out the dream of Father McGivney.

Two bandits rob restaurant

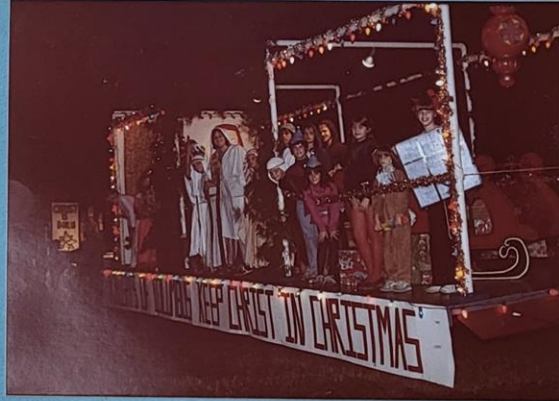
Two men, bound and blindfolded two employees of a Mary's Father Cut-Off restaurant during an armed robbery Friday night. Neither of the female waitresses was injured.

One of the men, who was armed with a small revolver, entered the Simply Delicious restaurant and demanded money, said Fort Walton Beach police Lt. Phil Irish.

Before leaving with an unknown amount of cash, the bandit blindfolded the women and bound their hands and feet with tape, he said. The second man waited outside.

No one was in the restaurant at the time, Irish said, and the women managed to free themselves and call police about 6:30 p.m.

The armed bandit was described as black, in his late 30s, about 6 feet, 3 inches tall and very thin. He wore fatigue pants, a long-sleeve fatigue shirt, a fatigue hat and scuffed combat boots. He was unshaven, had bad teeth and spoke poorly. Irish said no description was available on the second man.

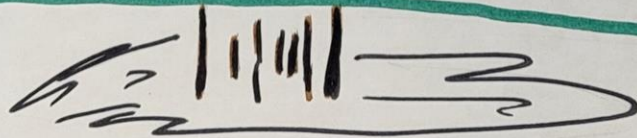
